

## Extractive resources overlay

### What is the Extractive resources overlay?

The Extractive resources overlay identifies significant extractive resource areas and provides additional measures to protect these areas for incompatible uses that may encroach or adversely impact on the ability to utilise these resources.

Council's Extractive resources overlay advances the State Planning Policy state interest for Mining and Extractive Resources.

The overlay map shows Key Resource Areas (KRAs), including:

- KRA resource processing areas
- KRA separation areas
- KRA transport routes
- KRA transport route separation areas

Key Resource Areas are determined by the Queensland Government, through Geological Survey of Queensland (forming part of the Department of Natural Resources and Mines, Manufacturing and Regional and Rural Development). Council is required to show all Key Resource Areas, as well as Mining Tenements, in its planning scheme.

The overlay code has measures to:

- ensure productive areas are protected from development
- provide buffers for the establishment of sensitive land uses
- limit additional access to transport corridors and haulage routes

### What changes are proposed?

The Extractive resources overlay map has been updated to:

- incorporate the latest Key Resource Area mapping from the Queensland Government, including a new KRA at Harlin (No. 167)
- make presentation changes to better reflect the appearance of the State Mapping

The table of assessment for the Extractive resources overlay has been redrafted to improve clarity.

The Extractive resources overlay code has been amended to correct minor technical errors.
